Had an interesting chat with Ariel Adams re the Multiple Sclerosis 150-mile round trip ride from Wheeling to overnight in Rockton, Illinois, at the Wagon Wheel resort and back.

All of the weekend is free..meals, transporting luggage, overnight and all facilities at the resort including hayride, campfire and cookout. At the return to Wheeling there will be an ice cream bash provided by Bresler's.

Minimum pledges for participants is \$225. \$50 must be in by June 1 and one lucky participant will win a drawing for an RRB bike - a replica of the one Lon Haldeman used on his Great American Bicycle ride double cross the U.S. Custom fit - \$1,000 value.

The deadline for the balance of \$175 in pledges is June 11. All participants will receive a water bottle.

Safety Officers Corner Mike Enwright

I have ridden in all but one of the scheduled rides this spring and, using the March Monthly Meanders safety article as a reference, my observations are as follows:

- Most club members do ride single file on moderately-to-heavy traffic streets or roads.
- Most club members cause motorists to pass across the solid yellow line on lightly trafficked roads.
- When "Car back" is sounded, some club members either don't hear the alert sounded or don't care to do the right thing - or they take their good natured time in going to single file.
- 4. I find it difficult to criticize my fellow cyclist for not giving hand signals for hazards (potholes, glass) turn signals and stopping because the control of your bicycle is most important. But, verbal commands can surely be given by calling "Hole" "Glass" "Stopping". Let's all work to improve this.
- 5. I personally make it a point to get my bike and my body off the roadway during rest stops and breakdowns. But I notice most club members don't get off the roadway. This is the most abused of all safety rules. I will make it my personal goal for the remainder of this season to request all club members and guests to get off the roadway during stops. I ask all ride leaders to assist me in making this happen.
- Most club members do stop when auto traffic is present at 4-way stops but occasionally, when larger groups are riding, we tend to take advantage of our numbers and hold up traffic.
- Fortunately, tailgateing or drafting isn't a problem in our club riding but temptation may arise when participating in invitational rides.

May 30 60 HILL KILLER - Long Grove


