Get ready, get set, GO-GO-GO! The spring has finally arrived thanks to some unusually warm weather. As I got my equipment together on Sunday morning, March 11th, for Woyteck's Show 'N Go, I realized why we keep telling you, as riders, to prepare the night before. I took my road bike down Sunday for the first time since late October and discovered a flat! With time awastin' I tried in vain to fix the flat, but couldn't find the right floor pump. Luckily I had my ATB as a spare so I did make the ride. Sound familiar? We're all guilty of not being prepared at one time or another. Remember as riders we are 1/2 of the ride and are responsible for 1) having our gear ready (I still need to tune up my road bike), 2) getting clothing, food and water bottles together, 3) leaving enough time to sign in and



get a cue sheet and 4) waiting for the leader's announcements before leaving. As you start the new season, be extra careful and get into some good safe riding habits while you shake off the dust (and fat) of winter. See you on the road!!!

SAFETY CORNER

The explosion of Lycra apparel in recent years has brought comfort to a great number of cyclists. In addition to comfort, tight-fitting Lycra has become quite popular for all-purpose wear. One problem with Lycra shorts is that they don't have pockets. By now you're asking, "Is Rice off his rocker? We all know cycling shorts don't have pockets!"

The point I'm getting at is that quite a few people don't carry some important things since they don't have pockets. That's the only reason I can think of for why people don't take along some form of personal ID when riding. Everyone seems to take car keys! It doesn't take much more effort to take the driver's license out of your wallet and drop it in your tool bag. Also remember to carry some kind of medical information card that lists things like allergies to medication, doctor's name, insurance information and a contact name in case of emergencies. Contact your doctor or insurance agent for these cards, or I have a couple other sources if you can't get cards from them.

What else should you carry with your ID, spare tubes, patch kit, tire irons and a few basic tools? A few quarters for a phone call can go a long way when you can't reach your destination. I also carry a little extra money for emergencies, be they food or equipment. A few bandages or self-adhesive gauze pads can make a minor injury bearable for the rest of a ride.

The list goes on and on. I've tried to mention the bare minimums, but everyone has their own unique requirements. I wonder if Samsonite has ever considered entering the cycling gear market???

IT WAS TWENTY YEARS AGO...

I was born and raised on the north side of Chicago and, when I married, moved to Evanston for 28 years, one year in Northbrook, and then, December 23, 1969 moved to Wheeling. I was a member of the Evanston Bicycle Club, Sprocket Wheel Cycle Club (city wide) and Columbus Park Wheelmen (west side). I became familiar with bike routes north into Wisconsin and all over the west side, but I, along with most cyclists, knew absolutely nothing about Chicagoland's northwest area.

My first reaction to moving into Wheeling was, "Good Heavens! What have I done?" As near as I could tell, the only east-west roads were Dundee and Palatine Road, and not much was ran north-south either. Not much of what I would consider good for bicycling! Nevertheless, I decided to organize a bicycle club; there was no club in the area and Evanston was 18 miles away. I

phoned the Wheeling Park District-office then in Jack London School on Dundee Road- and made an appointment to talk to Keith Vernon. He thought a bicycle club was a great idea- he had two boys just the right age to ride along. Here is the story as it appeared in the May, 1970 L.A.W. BULLETIN:

Activities In Wheeling, Illinois
With publicity distributed to the

schools and local newspapers by the Wheeling Park District, the first gathering was Friday evening, April 26. Due to conflict of dates, Keith Kingbay

was at Gary Steinke's program for

bicycling in Milwaukee and I took charge of the Wheeling program. We

had the always enjoyable film "Magic of the Bicycle;" all types of bicycling literature; Flo Lobraico, AVH cycling chairman, demonstrated riding the rollers; Bill Erickson demonstrated a modern 10-speed lightweight bike and there was discussion on riding, coming events and local rides. Over 100 people attended this first event.

On Sunday, May 2, the first Wheeling ride was held with starting point at Heritage Park and 69 bicycle riders. Twelve cyclists came in from St. Charles, others were from Palatine, Rolling Meadows, Des Plaines, Elk Grove Village, Chicago south side, Evanston, Wilmette and, of course, Wheeling. We are greatly appreciative of the assistance given by Charles Boynton, Chicago Council President, and his Sunday 9:00 am riding group. They scheduled their ride from Evanston so as to circle through Wheeling in time to join our ride.

The route went down Wolf Road to Palatine Frontage Road to Palwaukee Airport and back.

Across Illinois Bike Ride '90. The Joliet Bicycle Club will hold the 9th annual Across Illinois Bike Ride (A.I.B.R. '90) on August 4th-7th, '90. This is a 4-day, 300-mile cycling tour through the Illinois countryside. It starts along the Mississippi River in Moline, IL and travels eastward to the "Illianna" (IL-Indiana) state line and finishes in Joliet, IL.

Routes are over mostly rural roads. Be prepared to enjoy up to 80 miles of cycling a day. The tour is known for its small size (250 rider limit) so register early!

Cost: \$45 advanced registration (more after July 1) (\$25 for an extra 2 day option). Includes: T-shirt, baggage transport, sag wagon, marked route and cue sheet, Sat. night supper in Dixon, Mon. supper Kankakee.

boulevard lakefront tour

The Boulevard Lakefront Tour is a non-competitive ride designed for the enjoyment of seeing Chicago as you've never seen it before! A 35-mile loop starting from the University of Chicago Midway Plaisance, you will travel the Boulevard network north to Diversy Parkway and return along Chicago's beautiful lakefront. The tour concludes with a "Chicago style" post ride party!

The 35-mile loop goes through 11 parks and is greenway for all but 3 miles. These open greenways, lined with trees and grass have been nicknamed the "Emerald Necklace" and provides some of the best cycling in the city.

victorian celebration

The International Veteran Cycle Association has announced that its 1991 Meet and World Championship will, for the first time, be held in the U.S. It will be hosted by the Wheelmen (*not the Wheeling Wheelmen*) and will be held in conjunction with its National Meet.

"Veteran Cycles" is the European term for what Americans would call antique bicycles. The IVCA is made up of people around the world interested in preserving the history and heritage of the bicycle. The Wheelmen is the national organization for America. In addition to collecting and restoring antique bikes, they also conduct tours in which members dress in costumes reflecting the period of the bikes they ride. They also hold races for the old bikes.

The IVCA Meet and World Championships will be held June 26-30, 1991 in Findlay, Ohio, in conjunction with a communitywide "Victorian Celebration." (The invention and development of the bicycle took place during Queen Victoria's lifetime).

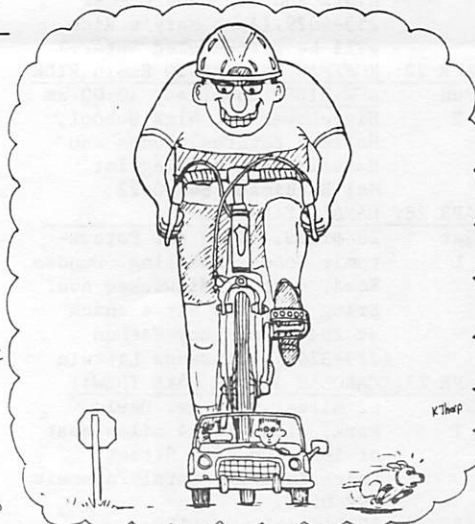
Pedal patrol

New mounted police: bikers



These days, criminals in cities as Seattle; Tucson, Ariz.; Portland, Ore.; and San Francisco might want to consider roller skates. Police, after all, are patrolling on bikes. The new bike patrols were such a hit in Tucson (which reported a one-third increase in arrests over the foot patrol), Phoenix followed suit in October. Now the Arizona Game and Fish Department wants to start one.

The advantage: Bike patrolers catch unsuspecting lawbreakers by surprise. "It doesn't register that we're cops," says Tucson officer Dennis Stonehocker, pictured above center. It's also cheap. A patrol car costs about \$20,000; equipping mountain bike with a radio, lock, repair kit, first aid kit and computer to clock speeders- who are usually caught at stoplights- costs \$600-\$750.
